Last March 13, 2020, we received an order from the Governor to "stay in place" due to the rapid spread of COVID-19. Eleven months ago, we had little understanding of the "stay in place" order, and even less understanding about how COVID 19 was about to impact our community and our district. Yet, as we distributed devices to all students and ensured connectivity for their academic engagement, we also started to design a plan to "reopen our schools."

Looking back, I see that we have begun a plan that has evolved as the Pandemic evolved. After a number of virtual Town Halls and surveys, we envisioned a reopening plan that will bring back the most vulnerable of our students. Unfortunately, the "re-opening" date just kept moving. Summative ELPAC Testing - (February 1-May 31)

Students in kindergarten through grade twelve who are classified as English learners will take the Summative ELPAC every year until they are reclassified as proficient in English. Students are tested on their skills in listening, speaking, reading, and writing. Testing begins in February and you will be notified by your child's principal of the exact schedule.

Depending on the schedule and child, some components of the test may be administered remotely. The test examiner will connect with each child by computer. To make sure that each student receives the most accurate score, we are providing the following guidelines for student testing:

- 1. You may assist your child with setting up the technology used to enter the test session.
- 2. To keep the test fair for all students, we ask that you do not talk about the questions on the test or any materials for the test with anyone before, during, or after the test.
- 3. No one may record the test, or use a camera or another device to take pictures of the test questions or of your child taking the test. This helps to keep the questions confidential.
- 4. We need to know that the test is being completed by your child without any help. To verify compliance, a web camera and microphone will be used to observe your child while taking the test. The camera is only used to observe your child and the surroundings during the test and will not record the session.
- 5. Please follow all instructions given by the test administrator or examiner to place the camera where your child and the child's immediate surroundings can be observed.

If your child cannot use the computer's camera, microphone, and speaker or headphone during remote testing, you may contact your child's principal for another way to administer the test to your child in-person.

You are an important part of your child's education. To help your child get ready for the test, you can:

- Read to your child, or have them read to you on a regular basis.
- Use pictures and ask your child to tell you what they see, or what is happening in each picture.
- Provide your child with opportunities to use language outside of school.
- Talk with your child's teacher about your child's listening, speaking, reading and writing skills to help support their progress.
